

James B. Murphy was in charge of the Department of Herpetology at the Dallas Zoo from 1966 until his retirement 30 years later. Currently, he is a Smithsonian Research Associate in the Department of Herpetology at the National Zoological Park in Washington, D.C. In 1989 he received an honorary Doctor of Science degree from the University of Colorado. Murphy served as the President of the Society for the Study of Amphibians and Reptiles in 1981. He has published eight books and a number of papers, book chapters, and bulletins on herpetological topics. He is section editor of the ZOO VIEW column in *Herpetological Review*. Currently, he is a board member of the IUCN/SSC Declining Amphibian Population Task Force and a member of the Captive Breeding Specialist Group of that organization. His research interests are now centered on developing quantitative methods for assessing the competence of animals raised in captivity and the behavior of reptiles.
